# Keep your kids safe. Get their flu shots every year. The Flu: A Guide for Parents

Is the flu more serious for kids?	Infants and young children are at greater risk for getting seriously ill from the flu. That's why the New York State Department of Health recommends that all children 6 months and older get the flu vaccine.
Flu vaccine may save your child's life.	Most people with the flu are sick for about a week, and then they feel better. But, some people, especially young children, pregnant women, older people, and people with chronic health problems can get very sick. Some can even die. An annual vaccine is the best way to protect your child from the flu. The vaccine is recommended for everyone 6 months and older every year.
What is the flu?	The flu, or influenza, is an infection of the nose, throat, and lungs. The flu can spread from person to person.
Who needs the flu shot?	<ul> <li>Flu shots can be given to children 6 months and older.</li> <li>Children younger than 9 years old who get a vaccine for the first time need two doses.</li> </ul>
How else can I protect my child?	<ul> <li>Get the flu vaccine for yourself.</li> <li>Encourage your child's close contacts to get the flu vaccine, too. This is very important if your child is younger than 5, or if he or she has a chronic health problem such as asthma (breathing disease) or diabetes (high blood sugar levels). Because children under 6 months can't be vaccinated, they rely on those around them to get an annual flu vaccine.</li> <li>Wash your hands often and cover your coughs and sneezes. It's best to use a tissue and quickly throw it away. If you don't have a tissue, cough or sneeze into your upper sleeve, not your hands. This will prevent the spread of germs.</li> <li>Tell your children to: <ul> <li>Stay away from people who are sick;</li> <li>Clean their hands often;</li> <li>Keep their hands away from their face; and</li> <li>Cover coughs and sneezes to protect others.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
What are signs of the flu?	The flu comes on suddenly. Most people with the flu feel very tired and have a high fever, headache, dry cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, and sore muscles. Some people, especially children, may also have stomach problems and diarrhea. The cough can last two or more weeks.

How does the flu spread?	People who have the flu usually cough, sneeze, and have a runny nose. The droplets in a cough, sneeze or runny nose contain the flu virus. Other people can get the flu by breathing in these droplets or by getting them in their nose or mouth.
How long can a sick person spread the flu to others?	Most healthy adults may be able to spread the flu from one day before getting sick to up to 5 days after getting sick. This can be longer in children and in people who don't fight disease as well (people with weaker immune systems).
What should I use to clean hands?	Wash your children's hands with soap and water. Wash them for as long as it takes to sing the "Happy Birthday" song twice. If soap and water are not handy, use a hand sanitizer. It should be rubbed into hands until the hands are dry.
What can I do if my child gets sick?	<ul> <li>Make sure your child gets plenty of rest and drinks lots of fluids.</li> <li>Talk with your child's health care provider before giving your child over-the-counter medicine.</li> <li>Never give your child or teen aspirin, or medicine that has aspirin in it. It can cause serious problems.</li> <li>Call your child's health care provider if your child develops flu symptoms and is younger than 5 or has a chronic medical condition like asthma, diabetes, or heart or lung disease.</li> <li>If you are worried about your child's illness, call your health care provider.</li> </ul>
Can my child go to school or day care with the flu?	No. If your child has the flu, he or she should stay home to rest. This helps avoid giving the flu to other children.
When can my child go back to school or day care after having the flu?	Children with the flu should be isolated in the home, away from other people. They should also stay home until they have no fever without the use of fever-control medicines and they feel well for 24 hours. Remind your child to protect others by covering his or her mouth when coughing or sneezing. You may want to send your child to school with some tissues, and a hand sanitizer, if allowed by the school.

Dear Families,

The changing of the seasons has quickly come upon us and the children are beginning to form new friendships and become more independent. It is a pleasure to watch them as they become more comfortable and outgoing with the teachers and their peers.

I can't believe that October it's almost gone! We had such fun celebrating autumn and Halloween. Our reading focus was the concept that letters make words, and words are made up of letters. We also focused on alphabet exposure through name work and the letters: "Aa", "Pp", and "Cc". We also discussed the parts of a book, and the role of the author and illustrator.

In November we will be talking about our community helpers, ourselves, our families, and what it means to be thankful. We will also be learning about the first Thanksgiving and of course we will be creating some pretty cute turkey projects!

For most of November, we will be working on the letters "Mm", "Ff", "Ss" and the sight words "I", and "see". Not only are we focusing on how to write the letters but we also reinforce the sound that each letter makes. Please practice letter sounds at home.

In math we will still be working on the same concepts taught in October: identify numerals 1-5; count to tell the number of objects (up to 5,1:1 correspondence); sort and count the number of objects in each set (up to 5); match numerals to quantities (up to 5); practice rote counting to 20.

# Greetings from Ms. Rutnik's Kindergarten Class!

**News**: We are hopping along in our Hop Into Books Program. Please continue to read, read, read, and sent the response sheets in with the books. WMHT's Goodnight Gorilla event was fun. There will be another WMHT program in the spring.

Our themes have been very short (one week), not nearly enough time to develop a theme. We have learned the difference between bugs and insects, reviewed rules, and will be exploring sounds around us. You will be given a scope and sequence of the Wonders ELA program which contains the additional words we have been given to teach. Please make cards and practice the words. They are not necessarily part of the 90 words we gave you. The words in the scope and sequence are from the Frye list. Sorry for the confusion. We cannot wait to meet with you!

In math, we are learning the terms: even, greater/fewer, and are exploring combinations of numbers to ten. We count every day, adding a on a day, as we creep toward the 100<sup>th</sup> day.

In writing, we are beginning to delve into narratives. Our attention should be on true stories. They need to have a beginning, middle and end, telling who is there, where they are, and what they are doing. Practicing oral stories will support getting these stories on paper.

Please keep us informed of any changes happening in your child's life so we can be sensitive to your child's needs. Contact us whenever you have questions or concerns. We value your opinion.



It's very important your child does their homework each night and read and practice their math facts. # November

In math we are literally flying right through the understandings of place value, addition, subtraction. We will be moving onto multiplication and division. Your children should have mastered their multiplication facts by the end of third grade. Unfortunately, many students have not <sup>(2)</sup> Mastery of facts is done in part by repetitive practice both at school and at home. Multiplication flash cards may be purchased at the dollar tree for a \$1. It is essential that your child memorize their multiplication (and later on division) facts. Without this memorization, math will become increasingly time consuming and difficult for them.

In Social Studies we are about to begin our unit on the Native Americans with a great field trip to the NYS Museum planned for **November 8<sup>th</sup>**. While at the Museum we will get the chance to see a long house and learn more about the way Native Americans used to live in New York State. Your child will also be bringing home a fun social studies project on the types of homes that Native Americans used to live in.

In Science we are conducting experiments using the Scientific Method and we are learning how to use metric measurement tools. Please be on the lookout for Science Fair information which will be coming home at the end of the month!

In all academic areas *study guides* are used to help prepare students for upcoming tests. Study guides are handed out in school, gone over, and sent home. If you child studies for these tests they will do well. However, they **MUST** study for the tests. This fact is just the reality of school becoming more challenging as your child moves forward in their educational careers.

Homework is of great importance in your child's academic world. In order to succeed at anything you must practice... and then practice some more. Homework does just this for your child. We teach your child the skills in class; however they will only become truly successful with a specific concept or skill if they practice what they have learned in class. You can help your child to achieve academic greatness by partaking in their homework and study habits with them.

<u>Word Study and Vocabulary</u>: Word Study is well underway! Each child has been placed into a word study group, based on their current word sound knowledge. Studying words will help students notice patterns amongst words, allowing them to learn more words and expand their vocabulary. Please remind your child to complete his/her homework nightly. Word study homework is due on Fridays. Friday is also the day we take our word study and vocabulary quizzes- look for them in your child's Take Home Folder on Mondays. We are excited to see the growth!

<u>Math</u>: We are in the middle of our unit on Place Value and will soon begin learning how to multiply and divide decimals by whole numbers. In order to be successful in math this year, it is important that basic multiplication facts are being practiced regularly (up to the x12). A letter was sent home with tips and interactive computer games that students can access and use to practice with at home. <u>Science</u>: We are in the middle of our unit on The Human Body. As you know, every Friday we do an interactive experiment surrounding the topic we are learning about. We've learned that our body is made up of 206 bones. Did you know that a baby has over 60 more bones than an adult? Here's another fun fact: the jaw is the strongest muscle in the human body. We can't wait to learn more about each system in the body- the Digestive and Circulatory Systems are up next!

<u>Social Studies</u>: We have been learning about the 5 different geographical regions in the United States: West; Southwest; Midwest; Southeast; North East/Mid-Atlantic. Students have been researching specific states and noting how they are similar and different to states in other regions. Using their findings, they have made an online presentation. Some students have chosen to make an online interactive poster, called a Glog (<u>www.glogster.edu</u>); others have created a slideshow through Google Slides or Prezi (<u>www.prezi.com</u>). All students are expected to have presented to the class by next week. Check out their finished projects on our class website under the "Digital Projects" tab. Our next unit will be Colonial America.
